


Souvenir plate



From Emma L. Beitz (nee Maconnaughey, spelling varies of the Huntingdon Co., PA line, where she still lives.): I lost a dear sister to cancer last August. Spent last January in Arizona with four of my sisters --- travelled over a large part of the state at that time. It was wonderful -- except for the fact that we knew we were losing Eva. Now my husband is in bad shape. He will see an 'Internist' right after Christmas. I suspect that he is seriously ill, but he just tried to keep right on as tho he's still a young man. He's 69 --- has worked hard all his life. We have a new grandson born in Sept. that makes eleven now. Thank you for writing and sending newsletter & reunion notices. Ordinarily I might not have shared this letter; but Emma is NOT a member and not apt to see it; but I thought someone who might be in the area might contact her some time, just to say 'hello' --- I know she would appreciate it.


Although this letter is not from a strictly McConaughey descendant, she is related to the McConaugheys --- the editor's own line at that, and has contributed many things because of her connection. In March 1985 she started a letter to me and noted that she was glad she visited Lyle McConaughey, Aurora, NB the year before he died. She sent some pictures with the letter and went on to describe the tombstone they had erected for her husband, who died in 1983-4, unexpectedly and too young: "...I'm also enclosing a pic of our stone which the kids insisted I design so it is full of symbolism; wheat for farming, post rock for my drawing passion, EMT and state seal for occupational interests. Anyway, I was pleased with what the memorial company did with it and I have so many people who come to me after seeing it and tell me how I impressed they are....." The next 'installment' is in April 1985 and she has by now mislaid the pictures taken at Lyle's place in NB and has been holding instruction workshops for emergency medical care. She's also doing volunteer work at a Youth Center for girls in Kansas --- a really busy lady. The letter winds up with a hand-written note dated Nov. 1985, and she had FOUND the pictures and enclosed them! I hope you'll take a page from Lee's book and don't give up writing, even if it takes 8 months to finish one letter! The lady in question is my CARL/WEST cousin, Lee Nichols, 905 Northwood Drive, Beloit, KS 67420 and I hope she hasn't crossed me off her list by now, but it's been a while since I heard from her.

Looks like Lee and I aren't the only ones who drag letters out for days (and months!). I have a letter from Pat Benedict (Ivan's spouse), Port Huron, MI, dated 12/1/89: "This is the third stab at this uneventful letter. The first one the cat ate a sizeable chunk out of it. The second I became discombooberated trying to write s/o and d/o so I decided to copy the materials from which I gained some information because the history of how any family went from where to where always interests me and we never know when our family was in the area. For what its worth, here is my info gleaned from our trip several years ago into southwestern Pa.....Other information gleaned from Albert Torrence and Descendants: Franklin Co., Pa first was part of Lancaster Co.; 1749 part of York; 1750 part of Cumberland; 1784 became a county. In 1756 200 people of Franklin signed a petition for aid with Indians --- they were Scotch-Irish and English Quakers. Some names were James HAMILTON, David WATSON, Alexander BROWN, Aaron TORRANCE, William SMITH, Rev. Thomas BURTON, Wm. MILES, John GILLELAND, William BARD, Alexander WHITE, G. W. LATIMER, Wm. LINDSAY, Nicholas BISHOP. I extracted this info because it has several family names of Ivan's, namely BROWN, WHITE, SMITH and John GILLELAND, the latter Ivan has in eastern Ohio in early 1800, but can't go beyond....." I thought it was interesting, too, because of the names and the early date. Remember ---- Penn and his Quakers would not 'fight'; however, they were perceptive enough to know the Scotch-Irish, aka Ulster Scots, WOULD; so they made sure to have plenty of them 'on board' when they immigrated to America. The Scots did, as advertised, fight the Indians. Doesn't that make US the GOOD guys????

Elsewhere you should find a more detailed letter from Virginia McConnaha Kranz, of Stockton, CA, but this note on a card is also interesting: "Hi, Pat --- I spent part of last Saturday (Dec., 1989) touring the McConaghy House in Hayward, CA. Picked up a few mementos for you that I'll get in the mail after the Holidays." I love anything about that house and it's amazing --- many of you have gone there, but the things you send change and there's seldom a duplication. When there is, we keep one for our 'Archives' and use the other for the Gathering auction or door prizes; so-- don't let the possibility of duplication deter you!!

From David MC CONAGHA, 8119 Oaklake Ct., Alexandria, VA 22309, 19 Feb. 1989, when we were in Florida WITHOUT a working typewriter. I noted I finally got it March 14th, 1989; so must have been after I came home and apparently, I didn't answer it then! I hope this will make up for it, David: Although I received the 1988 Bulletin several weeks (or more) ago, I set it aside & did not thoroughly review it until recently. I enjoyed all of it, but was especially pleased to see the chart of John, the Covenantor on page 35. My father, Ralph, is the youngest son of George Cameron McCONAGHA & Daidy NELSON, and this is the first time I've seen the entire line displayed in this fashion. We recently put together the enclosed listing of my fahter's four children & their families (all listed are still living), and I'm enclosing a copy for your files.....Also including a business card as I've changed Jobs since I last sent one....." Well, we're at least 'even', David -- you hadn't seen your line displayed the way I do it and I hadn't seen a line displayed the way YOU do it! I had to do a switch by stages and I hope I have the right children with the right family, etc. I would also much appreciate it if you would provide the maiden names of the female mmebers of your family ---- starting with your mother; then maybe we can 'up-date' it in a newsletter or the next Bulletin. Thanks!




I hope I didn't make too many mistakes! This is John the Covenantor line, you know.

It's gratifying to find some of you really DO read the Bulletin as David did and as Dr. Will McConahey did. That's what keeps me going. This letter, was dated 21 Apr. 1986 and I imagine got put aside each year as I kept having too much material because I was a year behind. Now I'm only about a week behind (this is the 1989 Bulletin) & I'll have a clean slate to start for 1990; so keep those cards and letters coming, please!! From Dr. Wm. McConnell McConahey, 1122 6th St., SW, Rochester, MN 55902: "I AM WRITING TO YOU FOR SEVERAL REASONS, IN THE FIRST PLACE, IT IS HIGH TIME I did! I have meant to write to you for many months, but have indeed been busy and at long last I am writing this long overdue letter.....I very much enjoy reading your regular Newsletters and of course it goes without saying that I have very much en-

joyed looking over the Annual Bulletin which came recently. I note that on the chart of our line in the Bulletin, we are lacking information about recent members of the family. I will write this information down on a separate sheet of paper and enclose it in this envelope.....Although I finally did retire on January 1st of this year, I am still very busy.....writing two papers on thyroid cancer.....working on National Study on thyroid nodules..... As I think you know, my son Bill, and his family live on 60 acres outside of South Boston, Virginia. This is far down in the southern part of the state, just above the North Carolina border & about 20 miles east of Danville, Virginia. As I think I have also told you, they named their land, "Donachaid'.....Our son, Peter, who lives here in Rochester, is a medical artist and works with the Medical Graphics Department of the Mayo Clinic. He is the person in that Department who does models, sculptures, etc. and works with plastics. His wife is a medical secretary at the Clinic. At the present time, because she has two small children, she is working only half-time. Their first child, a little girl named Laura, is now three years old. Their second child, a boy, was born last October. His name is Brent. It is great to have at least two grandchildren in town whom we can see frequently, We only see the other grandchildr about once a year....." I am so happy to report that Dr. Will DID include his chart, whcih I have typed below. I must point out that he and I went to the 'same school' so to speak -- his cousin (several times removed), Samuel Chalmers McCONAHEY (1876-1971) led him through the genealogical paths years ago as He did me!

From my friend, Walter P. McCONAUGHEY (affectionately known to me as 'the Elusive Walter P.' during his State Dept. years), 1035 Somerset Drive, NW, Atlanta, GA 30317 wrote in May of 1987: "I read your monthly reports on the manifold activities and interests of the McConaughay Society with keen interest and enjoyment. All of us who are members of the Society are greatly indebted to you for your tireless work and selfless devotion. I wonder if some time it would be possible to run in the Bulletin or a Newsletter a listing of all the recognized variants of the spelling of our clan name. There must be well over a score of them." Really, every time I think I've seen them all, a new one crops up! About as close as you'll come is probably in the index section where we list a number of the spellings.

The picture and narrative on the next page were sent by Helen McCONAGHY, Ashland, OH, widow of James W. McCONAGHY and the hand-written notes are hers, sent Dec. 1989.

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The ancient site of **Dunlichity** dates back in Christian worship to the 7th century, and was dedicated to St. Finan. A statue of the saint survived in the parish until after the Reformation, but came to a fiery end at the Market Cross in Inverness in 1643.

There was a 'new' church at Dunlichity in 1569, although in the 1580's the pastoral charge also included Abertarff, Boleskine, Dores, Daviot, Moy, and Dalarossie. The congregations of Daviot and Dunlichity were united in 1618. The troubled years of the 17th and 18th centuries brought many changes to the people of Strathnairn and their churches. At Dunlichity, the 1569 building was replaced in 1758, and the watch-house built in 1820.

Of special interest at Dunlichity is the Robert McConachie bell, dated 1704, and the river baptismal stone, which would be more difficult to date....

Clan Ay, the Shaws of Tordarroch, have a burial enclosure at the east end of the building, and a farther separate enclosure is the burial ground of the MacGillivrays of Dunmaglass, both overlooking the graveyard which bears witness to past generations of Mackintoshes, MacBeans, MacPhails, MacQueens, and many othe local septs of the Clan Chattan.

For many centuries, the parish church of **Daviot** has been a significant landmark in Strathnairn, on the route north to Inverness.


While there is record of a church on the site since the 13th century, Cnoc an t'Saigart - the Priest's Hillock - (now partly removed by the new A9) takes tradition back to a pre-Christian place of worship, set between the ancient stone circle of Daviot and the signal station high on Dun Davie. The medieval church also featured a detached bell-tower, both of which were dismantled when the present building was erected in 1826. The surrounding churchyard, noted for a number of cup-marked stones, contains many interesting tombstones recording the story of friends and families of the parish.

It is now necessary to launch a **Restoration Fund** for these two churches, as a recent survey has presented the need for a new roof for each church, repairs to the stained glass windows at Daviot, and other essential maintenance work. In conjunction with this, it is intended to publish a small book on the history of the parishes of Daviot and Dunlichity.

Joyous Noël,

I hope this greeting finds you healthy and happy. 1989 has been a much better year for me in so many ways.

On the health front, I am nearly 98% back to normal. Last year I discovered that I was highly sensitive to the fluoride added to water and toothpaste and have been drinking only bottled water and St. John's Wort tea that helps stimulate the adrenal glands, whose function had been blocked by the fluoride. This has proven effective and my back is working now like it should, and without surgery!

It has also been a much more productive year and I feel that a great deal has been accomplished. Most satisfying has been the writing of the history of my home town, Morocco. This weekly column (which will later be compiled into a book) appears in the Morocco Courier and has brought a number of favorable comments from its many readers. It has provided me with a sense of completion, for I have had so much data stored in my head for so many years that it is good to unburden my mind and put it in a written record that will be here after I'm gone.

As an adjunct to this effort, I meet with a group of townspeople every fourth Friday of the month and tap their collective memory to help recall events of the past. One of the most productive meetings centered around the downtown. We went up and down the street listing all of the people who ran businesses from the time that the oldest one present could remember. I don't know when I have seen people so excited about history.

In May I hired a crew to paint my house in Hammond, and that is a load off my mind. The old house looks pretty good with its new coat of white and forest green. The area in which I live has been designated as the Harrison Park Historical District and one can see that the area is starting to improve. The paint job should last for a dozen years, so I feel good about it. However, it was difficult to admit that I needed to have someone else do what I had done for so many years myself.

The summer also saw me complete the front porch remodeling that I had to discontinue when I had my back problems. It now is very cozy in its stark white with a green turf carpet. I have used the porch more this summer than for many years past and it has been a source of great joy.

June and July were busy months at the antique shop. Having been closed the first three months of the year there was a lot to do to restock it. Also it was a time for furniture repair and refinishing, which had to be done while the climatic conditions were right to dry the finishes. There has been a great need for this kind of work, and I could keep very busy just doing it, so I limit my time to working only on antique pieces and things for the shop. And, of course, there are many flea markets and antique shows that go along with the trade. Buying is the fun part, but I am also finding more enjoyment in selling than in the past.

I helped my mother celebrate her 89th birthday this year and she is doing very nicely. She obtained her driver's license again and this gives her a sense of independence. Being in Morocco one night a week (the shop is opened on Friday and Saturday) has helped ease my mind

about her welfare, as well as taking care of the little things that need to be done around the house. Come next spring major overhaul is needed. I redid the house 25 years ago and it is now in need of repair.

The Archibald Clan again met at Morocco and it was one of the best meetings yet. Although it was not the largest group that had assembled, the editor of our newsletter and her family made it all the way from Kansas and we had a great time. Yours truly even auctioned off some antiques that had been donated to enrich our treasury. A lot of fun was had by all.

It has been a year filled with guests, for I have had a steady stream since the beginning of the year. It seems that visiting is now back in style and I for one really enjoy it. There have been many pleasant evenings spent around the fire after a nice meal, and that is what I most enjoy. I feel very blessed.

Once I started feeling like my old self, I took a trip, spending a couple of days in each Connecticut, New York City, and Portsmouth, New Hampshire. It was the first time in many years that I had gone on a trip just for the pleasure of it and I got into New England just in time for their annual display of fall colors. It was really a wonderful drive. It had been 25 years since I had visited Portsmouth and the city has been transformed, mainly due to the historical restoration of Strawberry Banke, the colonial part of the city. I was very impressed by the quality of the restoration and the little speciality shops that have sprung up for the tourist. Also the bed and breakfast with authentic period furniture was an unexpected delight. It was a joy, as were the meetings with many friends along the way.


The highlight of the year was an unexpected trip to NYC to see the Picasso and Braque Show at the Museum of Modern Art. A friend asked me to drive there with him. We left on Wednesday night, arrived in the city in the morning, saw the exhibit and started back the same evening, arriving in Indiana the next morning. 



Within the last year, Emma Louise McConaughay — born in Rochester in 1885 — recited original poetry from memory at the weekly "Prayer and Share Meetings" at the Asbury Heights Retirement Community in Mount Lebanon.

"I store them in my computer," Mrs. McConaughay used to say to Linda Larva, a social worker at Asbury Heights.

Mrs. McConaughay eventually stopped attending the meetings because her hearing and health in general began to fail. Despite this, her mind remained sharp.

On Tuesday Mrs. McConaughay, 104, a longtime resident of Beaver County, died at Asbury Heights, her home for eight years.

"Her mind was still very clear right up to the very end of her life," said her grandson, Roger Raulin of Mount Lebanon.

Mrs. McConaughay never lost her independent spirit — even in later years.

"When we'd go up and visit her at the home, she was always up and dressed, with her hair fixed and with her jewelry on — she

was a very proud lady," said Doris McKey of Conway, Mrs. McConaughay's niece by marriage.

March, 1989 I received a call from Jane Churchill Smithson telling me that her mother, Jane McConahey Churchill had passed away in Ohio after an illness of about two years. Besides Jane, she was survived by her husband, Dr. Stephen Churchill, son Stephen Churchill, and grandchildren. Jane was a LIFE member of the Society, one of the first in that classification. She worked with Samuel Chalmers McConahey, one of her cousins, on the line from Samuel McConaughy and Margaret Thompson.

Emmy Lou Moore, widow of our friend James Moore of Decatur, IL sent the page following this one which is the short sermon given at Jim's funeral at St. Joan's Episcopal Church in Decatur. The priest was a close friend of the Moores. The 1st of August he was called to a diocese in Iowa; but he and his family drove back in order that he could hold the service at Jim's funeral. Emmy Lou says one of Jim's friends took his genealogy records from his computer and they are in two bound books!

James Moore, August 12, 1989

We are here this morning to offer thanks for the life of Jim Moore, to express our feelings of love, support and concern for his family, to pray for the repose of his soul, to receive comfort and strength from each other and from faith in the teachings of the ancient religion of our civilization.

Jim was an exemplary family man. He was devoted to Emmy Lou; he listened to her; he respected her. He was very proud of his children, Mack and Madeline and granddaughter Merrah. And he was interested in and proud of the genealogy of his family. In fact he has written an impressive history of his family going back to his ancestors' emigration to this country.

It makes good reading; trained as a journalist he could sit down and wrestle words into place to mean what he wanted them to. This is no mean feat. More than that, he could express himself with wit and humor. I believe that one of the reasons his career at Staley's was so successful is that he could write a memorandum quickly and well.

He would write because he was literate. He knew how to read and he read widely. He was well informed about things in general. He was not just a technician or just an expert in his own field, ignorant of everything else; he was one of a decreasing number of generalists, informed about history, politics, the arts. In short he was a civilized man.

Above all he was a decent human being, a man of high integrity, honest, a man of his word, polite, considerate, of good humor, modest, in spite of his successes and the respect he won for himself in his professional and private life. He will be greatly missed by his family, his business associates and his friends. An inscription in one of Jim and Emmy Lou's books by their son Mack says it all from his loving family: "Thanks for all the things that are hard to describe - even by a poet."

When it came to religion Jim was a no-nonsense kind of guy. He had no patience with bombast, hypocrisy, soopy piety, histrionics, block-headed dogmatism, bigotry, narrowness, exclusiveness, the sort of religious attitude that professes to have all the answers to the mystery of life. He had honest doubts, skepticism about a good deal of what passes for religion these days, especially popular religion. And when accosted by it, he responded with wit and humor. One of the young priests here at St. John's rather foolishly, in a condescending tone remarked to Jim that he did not attend church regularly. Jim quickly responded that he did not, but that he did support it regularly and rather substantially. This retort quieted the young priest. Jim was also a substantial benefactor of the Diocese, serving as a Trustee, also of the Decatur Boy's Club, Millikin University, and Decatur Memorial Hospital.

Jim had a sense of the mystery of life and believed that the symbols and stories of the Christian tradition point to a mystery greater than themselves which lies beyond the myths and symbols of all the great religions of the world. And it is our prayer that beyond this dimension we call life he will be brought to fulfillment and perfection according to the loving and gracious will of the God who gave him life and made him a unique, lovely human being.

Let us recite the ancient faith of the church in the Apostle's Creed on page 496 in the Prayer Book.

In 1984 David FARIS produced the FARIS/FERRIS, etc. genealogy. I studied a copy because (get this), our daughter-in-law, Elaine (nee BRYANT), John's wife, was a FARIS descendant and was in the book. I was tremendously interested because the FARIS' appeared to come from the same part of the world --- Scotland by way of Co. Antrim (Ballymoney, etc.), North Ireland, that brought many of our McConaugheys & they came in the same time frame; so I wasn't too surprised to find in the 5th Generation (from the immigrant) on page 211 the following:

"448. JANE ELIZABETH CLELAND, daughter of Robert James & Margaret Mary (ERVIN) CLELAND was born at Cutler, Perry County, Illinois on 24 Apr. 1883. She completed two years of high school and then taught five years in rural schools of Randolph County until her marriage near Cutler on 24 Dec. 1910 to ROBERT HENRY McCONACHIE, son of David & Lucinda (STEELE) McCONACHIE. He was born near Sparta, Randolph County on 25 Feb. 1874. He completed four years of education and was a farmer near Sparta. He was a charter member of the Randolph County Farm Bureau and a school board member for many years. They were members of the Presbyterian Church. Their children were born near Sparta from 1913 to 1920. Robert Henry McCONACHIE died at Sparta on 25 May 1943, and was buried at Caledonia cemetery, Sparta. 

Pat McConaughay Gregory opened the meeting with recollections of the early history of the mcConnaughey Society and the Gatherings. This is the 14th Gathering. The Society was started in 1961 with about one hundred families. The membership now stays around one hundred and fifty families. The first bulletin was printdd in 1963. After a 'lapse' of several years, the 2nd was printed in 1971 and has been published annually ever since. Pat recommended the books, The Movers and Lords of the Rivers, by Nancy Niblack Baxter, distributed by Walden Books, nationally. They are about an early Scotch-Irish family who came to the United States, and their trials and tribulations in the new land. Pat recommended them highly.

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After a short break, a drawing was held for the door prizes, which were donated by those attending, and other donors. Clyde McConaughay shared his memories of the McConaughay family in Illinois.

After a delicious dinner, a drawing was held for a beautiful quilt, The Sons-birds of Scotland which was made and donated by Gleeda McConahay. It was won by Shirley McConaughay, daughter of Clyde McConaughay of Springfield, IL.

We were then privileged to be entertained by the Gordon Pipers, the group of Indpls. bagpipers (internationally known from their participation in the 500 Mile Race festivities). There were eight (8) pipers and two (2) drummers in this group; but the entire group is much larger.

Meeting adjourned until next time.

CHESTER COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA

In the 1930's, Lenore E. Flower, Carlisle, PA, did some McConaughay/McConahey research for Samuel Chalmers McConahey [1876-1971], known more familiarly to me as 'Uncle Mac'. In the early 1960's my father, Kenneth Earl McConaughay [1899-1975] and Uncle Mac 'bank-rolled' additional research through Mrs. Flower. For my own use, I have a notebook of her work, indexed. The extensive and productive research in Washington County, PA was reproduced in earlier Bulletins in installments. I intended to present the rest of her research also, but it didn't happen; so now is the time for the Chester Co., PA report. Mrs. Flower's genealogical methods were without a doubt great. She was meticulous when it came to important things like how the name was spelled or a date; but after that --- by her own admission -- her typing was simply atrocious! Having said that --- I hope you will find mine is a bit better!

Dear Mrs. Gregory:-

Certainly there is something in telepathy for each day, I have meant to write you. I want so much to go to Chester County and shall (D.V.) very soon, now that I have again heard from you. It was my understanding that you wanted me to wait until you had the report from Western Pennsylvania to see if any clue or added information came from it.

However I have been getting what material I could find as I go about. For instance I have found that in Philadelphia county and city [both now in city then city had county around it] there was in 1790 one John McConagy who had

1 male over age sixteen years(himself)
2 males under age 16 yrs
4 females in family

That name Conehy could so well have been McConegy [in taking census records as in taking tax lists] I don't believe any one was asked to spell the name, the writer gave it as he thought it sounded and so wrote it. I am a life member of the State Genealogical Society and I know the old Court records well, too. I do not know whether or not you would like me to send another day in Philadelphia after Chester en route home. That John Conegy was a store keeper-says the record and lived in the city itself. In searching graveyard records I found the charts of the family from Gettysburg and their intermarriages, you may or may not want them --- they are yours if you wish them. Found them in Dauphin or Lancaster County.

May I just say that this morning our thermometer registered 9 below zero, and I wish it were a bit warmer when I make the trip to Chester, but I shall be going soon and have really been deferred mainly because I did believe that your Western Penna. research was to be had first and reported upon for any clues. I am sorry that this has delayed the search. I had thought I would go in October. But my son, a College Professor, expected to leave on his year abroad in September, but could not get off until Oct. 25th, and then after that there were things to be done that had been held up. I shall hope to get off within the next two weeks if my health keeps at its present state of well-being.

In March, 1963 I received another letter advising me that Mrs. Flower had cashed my check, dated August, 1962, and suggesting that I 'alert' my bank to be expecting it at last!

In April, 1963 came another letter, after her research, but giving mostly a 'blow by blow' detail of how she traveled, what she ate, and where she stayed (which is of interest in itself). ".....I got a very interesting story of one fine old family that I tried hard to link the son James of the Cumberland deed to, and they from Nantmeal township, but I could not do it.....Ever since I have been studying my notes and seeking in every way to get Cumberland and Chester counties annexed to my satisfaction as to the James McConaughy who bought land in the section now Perry and did not die there.Then today going again into the Court House to see what I could get by verifying everything --- I found again only the Nantmeal Chester County deed, but in an odd miscellaneous conveyance I found something I had never found in this category before, 'Instructions' from James Conahey to a man with whom he had apparently a verbal agreement, in which he tells him he is going to sell the land immediately [I will send you a copy of the terse bit of 'Instructions'] but the great find is to see that the note is headed 'Lewistown' [this is Mifflin County which I had surmised would have been the next place for James to be going if he did not die in Perry County] and that shows us where to search next if you want me to do I will for I think prospects are excellent. It was so fine of the McConaughneys to give clues like that, so vastly different from families who seem to find secrecy the governing factor in their documented life-making searching a very difficult thing to do for their descendants....."

A couple of weeks later in April 1963: "Herewith a very full report of the McConnaugheys in Chester and in Philadelphia. I know you will find much of interest in it but the problem remains as to which parent was his. Was it the David who died in 1796 --- in Honeybrook [next to West Nantmeal --- was it that Robert McCinahy of West Nantmeal who died with so little estate that we can find nothing in the original papers nor anything in Orphans Court following his death in 1800. Again, could he have been the son of James and Cicily McConnahaugh of the baptismal records at New Castle --- but why of West Nantmeal? Mifflin County will give us a will of his or if he left that county will perhaps tell us exactly where he went from Mifflin and any and every other thing we ought to know of the McConnaghey in that county. Anyway, we know his wife was an English and his maternal grandmother a Cunningham. The story of that very rich Robert McCinahy who died in 1777 and who was I felt so likely in point of time to have been the James of Cumberland was one which even I as a well seasoned genealogist found pathetic in the extremes. One carried through the various phases of adjudication and all the heartbreak that went with it. Later too to find the gravestones of all three Robert and Jennet his wife and their son James --- as I delved in Philadelphia. I shall not be able to get to Mifflin county until next week or the week beginning Monday the 22nd at the earliest....." Obviously, she's still stuck on James of Mifflin Co., etc., although she KNOWS my man was William! I think she thought they would come together and I agreed with her. So far, almost 30 years later, they still have NOT come together.

Mrs. Flower's Own Introduction to her report: "McConaughay Family search in Pennsylvania. Chester County at West Chester --- all early records. Philadelphia, County [now embraced in its entirety in the city] roster of wills -- no McConaughneys found early. Research in old records and letters, notes etc. of the Cope Collection -- made by a researcher of the latter part of the 19th century, Gilbert Cope, never as conclusive as one might wish, he does not go in for wills etc. but for records he can obtain in various places, other than Court houses. LEF. Research made by Lenore E. Flower [Mrs. Guiles Flower], Carlisle, Pennsylvania, 1963."

CHESTER COUNTY RESEARCH --MC CONNAUGHY FAMILY

Deed Robert McCONNACHE from John POTTER Ux dated 15rh April 1761-Deed Book M page 250. John CULBERTSON Esquire one of the Majesties Justice of the Peace-for Chester. County-deed says that John POTTER and Ann his wife-grantor of this deed, sell in t_(?) 7th March, in the 1st year of the reign of George the Third, King of Great Britain, France, etc. Defender of the Faith [1761] said John POTTER being of West Nantmeal township, Province of Pennsylvania, Yeoman, to Robert McConaughy. The land to POTTER from Thomas and Richard PENN, absolute Proprietaries of the land by James HAMILTON. Land lies in West Nantmeal township, Chester County in extent being 205 acres subject to the yearly quit rent due to the Proprietaries, which is one half penny sterling for each acre. Now POTTER conveys this land lying in Nantmeal township Springton Manor. Signed John POTTER. Witnesses: John CAMPBELL and William CAMPBELL.

Robert McCONNACKY from John JACK Ux, dated 19th day of April A. D. 1762. John CULBERTSON Esquire, one of his Majesties Justices of the Peace for Chester County, came John JACK the grantor of deed and Jane his wife- showing that deed was made 5th August 1762 [must have been 1761] land in Springton Manor, conveyed by John JACK, Yeoman, and Jane his wife 33 acres for sum of 75 pounds and 18 shillings. John JACK signs. Witnesses: James BIDDLE, Richard TEA, Samuel MC MICHAN; Vol. 1, Book M., page 404.

Still another deed [no time to run down as it was nearly four o'clock closing time] land sold by Robert ELLIOTT to Robert MC CONNAUGHY 1768-- Vol. Q, page 55.

However, the very first reference to this Robert McConahy [McConaghy] is found in a land grant issued to him by the Proprietaries --- sons of William PENN] 250 acres, land in Chester County, January 5th 1733. Reference Third Series Pennsylvania Archives, Volume 24 page 86. and again, the same reference page 89: Robert McConaghy --- 200 acres May 25th 1748. I can give you many references showing him owning land in Chester County for many acres under different spellings of the name but unless you want them specifically I shall not add them here --- all turned up in my search or your. (sic) In the year 1767 Robert MC CONAUGHEY 2as taxes in West Nantmeal twp., Chester County with 800 acres --- 5 horses, 6 cows, 13 sheep and had 4 servants -- PA Archives Volume 11, page 337.

One David McConnaghey in same twp taxed with 2 horses 2 cows 5 sheep --- above reference page 47 in year 1765 when on p. 45 same year etc. Robert McCONNAHER [names so mutilated in spelling] with 600 -- 5 horses 9 cows 7 sheep 4 servants.

In 1769 West Nantmeal twp. Chester County the name is spelled Robert McConoughly-- taxes with 1000 acres, 6 horses, 6 cows, 20 sheep, 1 servant. David does not appear in this year's taxables . Above volume and reference page 608.

However in 1766 David McCONEHEE --- West Nantmeal township was a taxable as a young man and 'an Inmate' probably already married but with small personal taxables not listed. Pa Archives Vol. 22, p. 175.

Page 392 in year 1781 shows David McCONEAUGHEY taxes with 100 acres, 2 horses, 8 cows, 2 servants

"David McCONAHY OF Honeybrook township, Chester County, Letters of Administration were issued on his estate Nov. 14th 1796 to James GFEEN and John McCONAGHY. The bonds of sureties who were Gilbert GIBBS, and William MORRIS posted were but for the amount of 300 pounds [usually twice the amount of the appraisals estate.] As an Administration shows no heirs, I went into the original account files to see if any heirs were to be found. The account was posted Dec. 1st and again Dec. 15th, 1801. The number of the account was 4541. Going into the basement where these old accounts are kept I found three papers, none of which showed heirs being only the formal notice of Administrators appointed, and some brief notice of appraisement etc. Nothing more was to be found, nor did I find any Deeds for this estate in the brief time that I had at end of day. [See however my findings in Philadelphia Genealogical Society on this man's family. LER]

Elinor McCONAHY of Honeybrook were issued Nov. 17th 1795 to David McCONAHY and again the bond posted by the sureties was 300 pounds. The sureties were Roger NORTH and Ephraim ALLEN. Seeking in the original files No. 4485 I found no heirs listed and only one paper being the bond as secured. This was the wife of David McCONAHY.

Elonor McCONAHY of Honeybrook township Chester is shown with an Administration letters issued August 25th 1797 -- letters to John McCONAHY, with sureties --- letters ABN number of Administration account 4593. Sureties W. MONTGOMERY and John BOYD. The only paper found was one with nothing but routine granting of letters. The ABN suggest that a will may have been found but if found it was not among the papers referring to the estate. Again there may have been two Elonor McCONAGYS but this is doubtful.

Note on the above; In earlier days of Pennsylvania Court Houses, it was the privilege of a lawyer to take the will out of the file for estate settlement. However, in far too many cases such wills were not returned, although the intent to return may have been good. An old lawyer's office usually was a mass of 'undigested material' and modern Court Houses have far different systems. LEF.

We now come [not in alphabetical order of estate settlement but because there is a story here] to the will of the early and very rich Robert McCONNAGHY, whose finding in Chester County made me especially eager to run down his estate. It seemed to me that he could so well have been the father of the Robert of West Nantmeal twp. who came to Cumberland and later was in Mifflin County [cut off from Cumberland in 1789].

Robert McCONNAUGHY, West Nantmeal township, Chester County, had letters issued on his estate January 14th 1777 to James McCONNAUGHY. It was an Administration, no will despite his great wealth. The sureties were Elisha PRICE and William KERLIN. The number of this estate was 3031.

However in all cases where there is an Administration I run down every sort of legal adjudication of the estate before going into the original papers of the estate. The amount of the bond was 2000 pounds a huge sum for the day. But there was nothing found in any way, so original sources in old file were looked into with this interesting result.

Only this very emphatic notation was found as follows under date of 22nd November 1776: 'To all whom it may concern. This is to certify that my husband Robert McCONNAGHY late of Springtown Manor, Chester County died intestate without will and I am determined not to take any part in the Administration of his estate, therefore request it may be granted to my son James McCONNAUGHY.' Witness my hand, signed Jeannett McCONNAUGHY [made mark] Witnesses signing were James GRAHAM and Mary GRAHAM. Only two other papers, one Bond and sureties and other on inventory [person estate presumably] 209 (lbs.?), 15 shillings, 7 pence.

Will of James McCONNAUGHY, West Nantmeal township --- letters issued August 30th 1780 to Daniel GRIFFITH and Michael GRAHAM, Will Book 6 page 420, estate Number 3271 account filed July 6th 1789 and 1792. Will reads [in abstract thus]: 'In the name of God amen: this 8th day of December A. D. 1779', makes following bequests:

To housekeeper, Hannah SHARP, 1500 pounds

To two servants viz.: James STUART and Jacob LONG, each 500 pounds

To Mary KEEHAN and Frederick FYE each 500 pounds.

'To Beloved wife, Elizabeth 1000 pounds and the use of part of my plantation during her widowhood'

Appoints 'Beloved Mother sole heir of the remainder of the plantation for her life and at her death it shall be disposed of according to her wishes [says 'to dispose of as she sees fit.']}

Appoints as Executors Beloved friend [or friends] Dan GRIFFITH, Esquire and Michael GRAHAM, Jr. and John ELLIOTT. [Letter is not shown in letters granted], Signed: James McCONNAUGHY [signed as 'J' McCONNAUGHY].

Witnessed William McLEAN, Alexander McLEAN [he signed before William], Jesse BRODE(?), and John ELLIOTT.

Following closely upon the death of James McCONNAUGHY was that of his mother Jennet McCONNAUGHY of West Nantmeal township, Chester County, letters testamentary upon whose estate were issued. December, 1780 to James MOORE and Daniel GRIFFITH. Will Book 6, page 413 Estate Number 3287, 'In the name of God Amen: I Jennet McCONNAUTHY of West Nantmeal township, Chester County being weak of body but of sound mind on the 8th day of December A. D. 1780..' made will. 'Greetins to Rachel my son James' Daughter....' makes bequests of ' Grist Mill, dwelling house now leased to Phillip HERP, 30 acres of land nearest and adjoining Mill, water, from race --- all pewter, black mare and saddle, case of drawers, bed, and bed clothes 'her freedom to be purchased by John ELLIOTT at her expense' she to he under the care of my niece Mary DARLINGTON to time of maturity. To Mary DARLINGTON, My niece, the plantation where I live for life and at her death to be at her disposal. 'To every one of my brother's daughters now living --- 500 pounds -- Arthur's daughter Margaret in Carolina only excepted.' To James ANDERSON's daughter Margaret 500 lbs. Robert ELLIOTT 500 pounds to he in hands of his brother John ELLIOTT and giv4n to him [RObert] at his need. My brother, James GRAHAM, 1000 pounds, his wife Mary at his death. Nephew Samuel GRAHAM, 1000 pounds, and his brother, James GRAHAM 1000 pounds, continental money. To Isaac ANDERSON 400 pounds, Brother Jared's son James GRAHAM 5 shillings, made mark. Witnesses James STERRETT, Samuel BYERS swear they heard Jennett sign will.

Continuing this family I found the only other reference in the period concerning it. Orphan's Court Docket 8 page 72 under date of the 19th day of June 1781. The Court heard the petition of Joseph DARLINGTON and John GARDNER, Esquire, appointed by Court as Guardian of Rachel McCONOGY, an infant under the age of 14 years, the illegitimate child of James McCONAGHY, late of West Nantmeal township, deceased. This child perhaps indentured (white) and under contract until age 18. LEF. As a final court document bearing on this seemingly (to me) tragic family affair, the following Orphan's Court bearing date 150 years later we find the following James McCONNAGHY [written in] 1779 then Docket 56, page 245-246, land lying in Brandywine and Wallace townships [evidently out from once earlier confines of West Nantmeal township] under date of February A. D. 1931. Petition for the release of old legacies, made by petitioners Ellis BAKER and who shows that two tracts lying in Brandywine and Wallace townships were made in will of one James McCINNAGHY, deceased Dec. 8th 1779, will Book 8, page 420, legacies were made as follows:

[Disposition of James McCONAUGHEY's Estate, continued]:

John ELLIOTT -- 1000 pounds
Hannah SHARP -- 1000 pounds [will shows 1500 lbs.]
James STUART -- 500 pounds
Jacob LONG -- 500 pounds
Mary KEENAN -- 500 pounds
Frederick FYE --- 500 pounds
Wife Elizabeth -- 1000 pounds

Petitioners, say that these persons are 'unknown to them and as the legacies were given and as 21 years has elapsed, with no heirs appearing apparently, the decree ordered recorded that all claim to these lands be forever barred, by the court. Note on this family history --- family completely gone in the second generation.

In Philadelphia searching for something on this in old Genealogical records that might be found there. In the records of the Brandywine Manor Presbyterian Church Yard --- the following graves are found which refer to the family given hereto:

Robert McCONAUGHEY died April 7th 1776, age 76 years
Jennett McCONAUGHEY died December 9th 1780 aged 76 years.
James McCONAUGHEY died December 14th 1779 aged 38 years 6 months.

Gilbert Cope, early Chester County Genealogist, who was collecting early county records from the late 1870's to shortly after 1914, dates approximate, says this from some correspondent or some other data referring to these burials. 'Tombstones were erected by John ELLIOTT according to provisions of the will of Jennet McCONAUGHEY, she was a GRAHAM.'

Elizabeth McCONAUGHEY, widow of James McCONAUGHEY married James ELLIOTT and they for 125 lbs. gold and silver released right of dower of Elizabeth to James MOORE May 1, 1783, Vol. 2, Book E. page 146.

There is the Administration of one Robert McCONNAGHY of West Nantmeal Dec. 27th 1800, letters issued to James J. Wilcox; Sureties: Joshua FISHER and John GRAVES. Nothin appears on this estate in any Orphan's Court or in the short time before Court House closed in any deeds, but careful search was made.

Now the family of David McCONNAGHY of Honeybrook township [see page 1 and 2 this report] study of the formation of these townships show that West Nantmeal and a part of Honeybrook townships lie next to Berks County. A small part of Honeybrook lies next to Lancaster County. Brandywine and Wallace were evidently part of the original West Nantmeal twp. and lies west of it and Honeybrook. West Caln [originally Caln] also lies next to Lancaster County. These are important to show the lines of travel made by these early families going westward. Berks was out from Philadelphia, March 11th, 17__. The following Orphan's Court has to do with the Heirs of the David McCONNAGHY shown above, Docket 10, age 184. At an Orphan's Court held on the 18th day of March A. D. 18__ came John McCONAHY eldest son of David McCONAHY deceased 17th day of September A. D. 1786, residence in Honeybrook township. John McCONAHY said that his late father left to survive him, 9 children, viz.:

1. John, the petitioner
2. Robert
3. James
4. Jane
5. David
6. Elizabeth
7. Sarah
8. William
9. Elinor

and that said intestate, David McCONAHY was possessed at his death of 96 acres of land, asks distribution.

Later, in Philadelphia Genealogical Society seeking records I found this bit among the Cope records, saying Robert McCONAHY's wife was a GRAHAM.

David McCONAHY married Elinor GRAHAM, daughter of Arthur GRAHAM, Nantmeal twp., and had children [says Cope] John, Robert, Jane [born prior to 1774], James, David, Elizabeth, Sarah, William and Elinor [as we found from Orphan's Court records in Chester County], Cope does not say where he got the 'prior to 1774 date' but the death date of David [and Orphan's Court does not in that year 1786 show that any of the children were minors. LEF] This James looks somewhat plausible for the James of the Cumberland Deed who must have been a very young man then, but then Cope produces some baptisms that are equally tantalizing [From Baptisms from Immanuel Church New Castle (must be Delaware/)].

James, son of James & Sicily McCONNAGHEE was baptized 3rd day of June A.S. 1759 aged 3 months 9 days

John, son of James and Cicily McCONAGEE, September 5th, 1761 aged 10 months 20 days.

David, son of James & Cecily McCONALY, July 31st 1763, aged 6 wks 4 days.

Mary, daughter James and Cicily McCONOLY, December 19th, 1865 aged 2 mos. 2 days.

In Chester County the will of Arthur GRAHAM is shown as at West Nantmeal by Cope saying Arthur GRAHAM died 1765, his wife Jean died 1789. Children with births given with question marks for the most part [I am always doubtful unless I have some proof for birth dates. LEF.]

James (born 1742?)

Arthur

John (died about 1750)

Michael born 1752, s.p. before 2795 (seems to have proof for this date)

Jared born circa 1753; d. 1794 s.p.

David GRAHAM born circa 1755-7

Mary married Matthew ROBERTSON

Margaret married David McCLOUD

Helinor married David McCONNAGHY

Sarah born circa 1748 married Alexander LONG

Jean born 1757 married David LONG.

These birth dates, if correct, make the birthdate of a son James McCONNAGHY, son of Helen and David McCONNAGHY. However there is study yet to be made on the James of Cumberland later Mifflin county that will determine much of his ancestry, I hope. LEF.

There is a later will or rather Administration of one Joseph McCONAGHY that I send for the general McCONAUGHEY history in Chester County. We find mention of the children in Docket 23, Orphan's Court pages 220 (?) and 336. Appeared before the Orphan's Court of Chester County, Pa, James R. COOPER, Administrator of Joseph McCONAGHY, late of East Caln township who died intestate January 1860 and left also Widow Hanna McCONAGHY. and children:

1. Joseph McCONAHY, Philadelphia
2. Urro --- also of Philadelphia
3. Enoch

4. Elinor -- both of Sudsbury Twp. (Elinor & Enoch)
5. Rebecca married Thomas HARKINS, East Caln twp (adjoins Lancaster County)
6. Elizabeth married William PRESTON, cooper, Londongrove twp.
7. Susan married Evan BENTLEY, East Caln twp.
8. _____ (do not have this) ???
9. Sarah married Alban TURNER, Ohio
10. Hannah married Thomas MOSES, unknown

I was concerned primarily to getting the ancestry of James McCONAHY of East Nantmeal who came into Cumberland County, but took the above for the probable value in the family lines.

In Philadelphia I did not find a single McCONNAGHY will [early in Philadelphia county, as I had a very thorough searching done during my day there of every possible facet of the McCONNAGHY genealogy as it might appear in marriages deaths etc. from every possible source I was limited only to early wills. It takes very long to run down every Adm. but it is my belief that the McConaghy in Philadelphia did not stay there long in the early period and did not die (at least in the period up to about the first quarter --- at least of or after 1800) as no wills are to be found of them there. LEE.

I sent two dollars to a man in Perry county (there is no transportation to Perry across the mountain --- no railroad runs through (that stops at county seat) nor is any bus line running through and as I do not drive, it was easier to ask this friend who knows Perry well to locate in Recordes to see when James McCONNAUGHEY had left that county. I sent my query April 1st and he answered April 5th, saying he had just returned from eleven weeks in the hospital with severe surgery and could do no work for a long period of time. However he told me the James CONAGHY owned a small home with log stable and log house, this weas pioneer county then, one half mile north of Milford. Among the several thousand acres of 'furnace land' (forests, largely) from New Bloomfield to south of Newport, James McCONAGHY had considerable holdings. Later he moved to Mifflin County (We know he had 225 acres. LEE)

I had already found that James McCONAGHY's wife was a daughter of David ENGLISH of Cumberland, but my informant says that her maternal ancestor was a CUNNINGHAM (a good name) and rather numerous to run down if you like later. I need to know nothing further of him from my ill Perry County friend as I know that he had gone to Mifflin County from the following brief but informative document in the Cumberland County Court House, viz.: James McCONAHY to Thomas BOYD --- Vol. 1, Bk.BB, page 19 -- dated June 28th 1800 -March 13th 1815 dated Lewistown County seat of Mifflin County, 28th June 1809, 'Sir, after my compliments to you, Solomen BROWN was with me this day to purchase the land and ye have a grad (this is underscored in original copy of deed so the transcriber also did not know what the word was meant to be) about it and I wish him to have possession immediately and I expect to see ye soon and be accessible to you for any trouble that ye have been at. These from James McCONAHY. (word grad = agreed, I'm sure now, LEF). 'To Thomas BOYD.'

I do not find any deed to Solomen BROWN FROM James McCONAHY and believe that this letter evidently hand-written by James McCONAHY to Thomas BOYD was introduced instead of a deed. Perhaps too that James McCONAHY had gone on to Mifflin County soon after this land was sold and it was easier to record this simple statement of fact than to take the journey to Mifflin to have a more routine deed by drawn up for recording, at least so it seems to me.

I'm afraid my bad typing may give you as hard a time for you to decipher as James McCONAGHY's spelling did for me. LEF"

SPRINGTON MANOR

As virtually every American knows -- the PENN family had dominion over the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and their charter provided they could reserve 10,000 acres out of every 100,000 acres for their own use. In actuality, they allowed settlers, notably Ulster Scots, to settle with the understanding that they could buy the land later. Of course, it didn't work out that way and most were gone by the 1780's. Springton Manor Farm was one of eight manors in Chester County. Most were named for members of the PENN family. SPRINNETT was one of the collateral lines connected to the PENN line by marriage.

The first owner of the part called Springton Manor was Robert McCONAGHY/McCONEHEE/McCONACHY, etc. The area was about the same as the present day farm. Robert's estate was granted the land when the survey was completed in 1788. Robert died in 1777. Robert McCONAGHY and his son, James, built a grist and saw mill, as well as a miller's log house by the creek. The land stayed in the McCONAGHY family until sold at sheriff's sale in 1797. Isaac VAN LEER was the purchaser in 1797. There was another sheriff's sale in 1817 when Methuselah DAVIS purchased the property.

These days (1989) Springton Manor Farm is a working demonstration farm consisting of 300 acres, a Great Barn, a Bull Barn, an Implement Shed/Vehicle Garage, corn crib, Maple Lane, lined with mature trees and source of some great maple sugar (visit the Annual Maple Sugar Festival Second Saturday in March each year), Chicken House, Vegetable Garden, and other things like the Petting Zoo. The farm is open from Memorial Day to Labor Day for General Admission, open daily 10 a.m. - 4 p.m., scheduled groups upon request. From Labor Day to Memorial Day, general admission; Sat., Sun., & Holidays, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., scheduled groups Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. For more information contact SPRINGTON MANOR FARM., P. In Sept. 1989 a 250th Celebration was held at Springton Manor Farm, sponsored by Scottish Historic & Research Society and Wallace, West Brandywine and West Nantmeal Townships to publisize the early contributions of the Ulster Scots to this county in general and to Pennsylvania and Chester County in particular.

2-3 years ago Dr. Mark McCONAUGHEY, State Archiologist in Pennsylvania and Society member, had charge of a 'dig' in the Brandywine area and, since we had people there, we really hoped something spectacular would come up; but no such luck. Betty MACONAGHY KIENZLE, Prospect Park, PA kept us well informed about the Springton festival etc. and Lenore Flower's research gives us some pegs to hang our theories on. There must be some more information somewhere on these families! I've had dreams (nightmares???) regarding these Chester County families for years.

Add --- Robert McCONAUGHEY of the Gettysburg line was in Chester Co., PA before he went on to the Adams/York Co., PA area.

The traditional story in the Wm. McCONNAUGHEY/Ellen BERRY line is that William's brother, Robert, married Rebecca ASHLEY and lived in Chester Co. where they had at least two sons and possible daughters, also. We have no 'back-up' documents for this story; but there's just too much DETAIL for it to be pure fancy!

Let's tie this bunch up in a nice, neat, little package!!

WHAT'S COOKIN'?

I think it was Ivan Benedict, Port Huron, MI who sent a clipping entitled: "Scotch NEAT FLAVORING FOR FOOD" There's no indication of the source (paper or magazine, etc.); but the 'authors' were Cici Williamson and Ann Steiner. The caption under an inviting picture of several different kinds of food AND a lovely decanter of what must be Scotch says: "A wee dram of Scotch, the world's most popular liquor, can add unique flavor to any dish." "Scottish cooks use Scotch whisky in the way brandy, bourbon or wine might be used in recipes of other cuisines. On a recent trip to Scotland, we interviewed several Scots to find out how they cook with ustuebough (note: spelling a bit 'mangled' in the middle), Scottish Gaelic for water of life -- the world's leading liquor.

Fiona Macdonald administrative assistant at Glenmorangie distillery in Tain, Ross-shire, uses Scotch in whisky trifle, jams, dressings and cake recipes of her grandmother and great grandmother. But she is a modern-day cook. Donald Mackinley, chairman of Charles Mackinley & Co., Ltd., likes to flambe Scotch over buttered peaches. Neil McKerrow of the Scotch Whisky Association adds Scotch to custards and to in lieu of cognac. Bill Burgess, also a member of the Scotch Whisky Association, adds Scotch to his spaghetti Bolognese, pours it straight over ice cream and includes it in puddings and sauces.

The first time we tried Haggis, we poured some Scotch over the traditional Scottish dish and sipped a wee dram of the native drink on the side. Following are some recipes and suggestions for microwave cooking with Scotch whisky:

SCOTCH CAKE: Substitute half cup Scotch for the water listed in the package direction for a pudding-included chocolate or vanilla cake mix.

LOIN OF PORK: Baste a pork loin while cooking and make gravy from the drippings.

TRIFLE: Sprinkle macaroon cookies or lady fingers with Scotch before topping with fruit cake in Scotch-soaked cheesecloth to add a special touch.

WELSH RAREBIT: Stir a little Scotch into Cheese Rarebit.

GRAVY: Add a tablespoon of Scotch just before serving.

SALAD DRESSING: Substitute Scotch for up to half the vinegar called for in the recipe.

BEFF MARINADE: Marinate beef in Scotch before cooking; then, flambe Scotch poured over the hot cooked beef.

BAKED APPLE PUDDING WITH BUTTER SCOTCH SAUCE: 3 tablespoons soft butter, 1 cup dark sugar, 1/4 teaspoon vanilla, 1 egg, 3 medium sized tart cooking apples, peeled, cored and chopped; one-third cup sliced almonds, 1 cup buttermilk baking mix; 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon; 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg. Cream butter, sugar and vanilla together. Slowly beat in egg; stir in apples and half of almonds. Add baking mix, cinnamon and nutmeg; stir. Level batter in an 8" x 8" x 2" square glass baking dish. Sprinkle remaining almonds on top. Rotating midway through cooking, cook on 70 percent (medium-high) 13-15 minutes, or until batter tests done. Serve warm with Butter Scotch Sauce (recipe below) and unsweetened whipped cream. Makes six servings.

BUTTER SCOTCH SAUCE: 1/2 cup packed brown sugar; 1/4 cup butter; 1/2 cup heavy cream; 1 tablespoon Scotch whisky. Put sugar & butter in cup glass measure. Cook high 1 minute. Stir in cream. Cook on high 2 to 3 minutes or until mixture comes to a boil. Stir in whisky. Makes one cup. Note: Sauce is also good on ice cream, pound cake, & fruit.

SCOTCH PASTA: 8 ounces spaghetti, rigatoni or shell pasta; 2 shallots, finely chopped; 2 tablespoons butter; 4 to 8 ounces smoked salmon, coarsely chopped; 1 cup heavy cream; one-third cup Scotch whisky; 2 tablespoons lemon juice; chopped fresh parsley. Cook pasta conventionally while preparing other ingredients in the microwave in a 1-quart round casserole. Cover and cook on high 3 minutes. Add salmon. Re-cover and cook on high 2 to 3 minutes or until heated. Drain pasta well. Toss in salmon mixture, cream, whisky, lemon juice, and parsley. Makes four to six servings.

SWEET AND SOUR ZUCCHINI: 3 medium zucchini (about 1 pound); 2 tablespoons white wine vinegar; 1 tablespoon vegetable oil; 1 tablespoon Scotch whisky; 1 1/2 teaspoons sugar; salt and pepper to taste; 1/4 teaspoon dried basil leaves. Halve zucchini crosswise. Cut each half lengthwise in strips 1/4 inch thick. Put zucchini into a 2-quart casserole. Cover and cook on high 3 to 4 minutes; drain and set aside. Mix together vinegar, oil, whisky, sugar, salt, pepper, and basil. Pour mixture over drained zucchini. Re-cover and cook on high 1 to 2 minutes. Makes four servings.

L T. COL. DAVID MC CONNAUGHEY

Several times David McConaughey, Cincinnati, OH (of the Ligonier line) and I have talked about his ancestor who was in the Civil War. David insisted he was an officer (and I believed him), but I could find no record in my Civil War files for this David and I really thought I had ALL the Ohio Civil War McCONAUGHEY's. Believe me, I WANTED to find an officer --- I think they were good men and some should have accepted the responsibility.

After this year's Gathering David collected and sent several documents which PROVE (without a shadow of a doubt!) that his David was first a Lt. and then a Lt. Col. in the Civil War.

David McCONNAUGHEY was a First Lieutenant, Company A, 87th Battalion, Ohio Volunteer Militia, sept. 8, 1863. Sept. 25th, 1863 he was a Lieut. Col. in the same Battalion, etc. He resigned as LIEUT. Col. on July 10th, 1865.


There are written records of two similar, but different, telegrams on Western Union Telegraph Company forms. The first is to the "Commanding Officer, at Troy, May 4th, 1864, 87th Bat.. from Columbus, O...Furlough your men until Friday May thirteenth(13th) when you will assemble promptly. Proceed with your command to 'Camp Denison' and report by Telegraph.. Signed: B. Cowen, Adj. Gen'l O." Very faint and difficult to read. The 2nd telegram was to "D. McConaughey at Troy, May 4th, 1864 from Columbus, O., May 4th 1864. Furlough your command until Friday May thirteenth (13th) and proceed with Col. _____ to 'Camp Denison' reporting to me by Telegraph. Signe: B. Cowen, Adj. Gen'l, O."

There's another letter from the Dept. of the Interior, Bureau of Pensions, which gives, among other things, the requirements for a widow to receive a pension. This should be an interesting addition to your fund of knowledge.

".....2. The widow of an officer or enlisted or appointed man of the Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States, who served for at least ninety days during the Civil War and was honorably discharged therefrom may be entitled to a pension under the provisions of the act of April 19, 1908, without regard to whether death cause was due to the service, or to her financial status, provided that the widow was married prior to June 27, 1890, to the person upon whose service her claim is based. The rate of pension under said act is \$12 per month, and \$2 additional may be allowed in behalf of each legitimate minor child of such officer or enlisted or appointed man under the age of sixteen. Pension commences from the date of the filing of a valid declaration in this bureau. (See blank 3-007.)"

"3. The widow of such an officer or enlisted or appointed man whose death resulted from a cause incurred while in such service and in line of duty since March 4, 1861, may be entitled to a pension, under the provisions of Section 4702 & 4703, Revised Statutes of the United States, from the date of the death of the husband, without regard to the date of her marriage to him or to her financial status. There is no limitation as to the date of the filing of claims under said sections, and the rate of pension depends upon rank at the time that death cause was incurred, without regard to subsequent promotions, and ranges from \$12 per month in the case of the widow of a private or noncommissioned officer to \$30 per month in the case of the widow of a lieutenant-colonel or any officer of higher rank, with \$2 additional for each legitimate minor child under the age of sixteen, as indicated in paragraph 2. (See blank 3-006.)"

I apologize to everyone, but especially Pres. David McConaughey. I thought I had supplemental information in my Civil War files and I was WRONG! Maybe I can expand on the story or Lt. Col. David McConaughey next year or in the newsletter. Thanks!@!

Mulberry man is expert in the world of poultry

MULBERRY — You might say this fellow knows his chickens.

Recently, the American Poultry Historical Society chose Mulberry's Robert L. Hogue for its hall of fame. No more than five are inducted every three years.

Hogue and his wife, Marthe, have lived in Mulberry for 40 years.

During that time and before, Hogue compiled impressive experience in the poultry industry. His experience took him overseas to Europe, Asia and Latin America, where he worked for the Foreign Agriculture Service promoting American agricultural products.

He's been in the private sector, starting fresh out of Purdue University (Class of '36) at Phil Enders' electric hatchery in Frankfort. Later, he served as an extension poultryman at Purdue University.

He has served on numerous state and national agriculture boards. A former aviator, he retired in the 1950s as a major from the state Civil Air Patrol, having been its director of training and operations.

Today he's semi-retired, working for Kroger's quality control. And he does a lot of chicken barbecues for organizations like the Mulberry Community Club.

"I still average about 1,000 miles a week," the 75-year-old says.

So where did it all begin?

Hogue's interest in chickens started "back in the '20s as a kid," he says, when he was a 4-H'er in Wayne and Hancock counties.

After college, he became a part of an active egg and chicken production industry. He worked for hatcheries in Clinton and Kosciusko counties.

In those days, 80 percent of the chicks were shipped by parcel post. Indiana produce went to the Midwest, East and South.

Indiana, from the 1930s to the mid 1950s produced one out of every 10 chicks in the United States. Why was Indiana so strong then?

It was the state's railroad system, Hogue says. Rail provided the key distribution to the Great Lakes region and to the Appalachian Mountains area in the East and South. "Everything moved by rail," he says.

Hogue is life member of the World Poultry Society. He has served on the U.S. Committee since 1956, traveling to international congresses in Mexico City in 1958; Madrid, Spain, in 1970;

the United States in 1974; and Brazil in 1978.

In addition, he has worked with U.S. Foreign Agriculture Service in Brazil, Spain, Japan and Hong Kong.

In Mexico City, he ran a barbecue for up to 1,800 people. But that was nothing.

Hogue once did a chicken barbecue for President Eisenhower and Indiana legislator Charles Halleck. Eighteen thousand people attended.

Nowadays, besides keeping busy with his other activities, Hogue is collecting lots of poultry historical data from the Midwest for the poultry archives of the National Agriculture Library in Beltsville, Md.

Hogue still does a lot of 4-H poultry judging, both on the state and national level. Last year, he received a lifetime pass to the Indiana State Fair — a rare privilege.

He is a member of the Columbia Club in Indianapolis, a Republican social organization.

An Ohio native, he and his wife are the parents of two sons, Robert K. and Stuart L., both Clinton Prairie graduates.

He's lifetime president of his Purdue class, being selected that after its 50th anniversary. And at home Purdue games, he is the one in charge of admittance to the visitor's bench.

Oh, and one other thing. He likes his eggs sunny side up.

Poultry library needs help

IF YOU HAVE EVER GONE TO A LIBRARY for a book, you know that you first consult the library's card file. There, on the card that contains the title, author, publisher and subject of your book is a number. The number enables you to find the book you seek among the thousands of books on hundreds of shelves in the library.

Without a card file or catalog, finding a book requires the lengthy and painstaking task of checking hundreds, perhaps thousands of books.

That, believe it or not, is the current state of what has been described as "the world's largest collection of poultry literature and related materials."

In 1972, Dr. James M. Gwin gave his private collection of poultry publications, about 20,000 pieces and widely conceded to be the largest private collection in the world, to the National Agricultural Library (NAL). The NAL, in turn, is the world's largest agricultural library, housing almost two million volumes. It is located in a modern, high-rise, 15-story building on the grounds of the 475-acre National Agricultural Research Center in Beltsville, Md., just a few miles northeast of Washington, D.C.

The Gwin Collection, as it is now known, is housed on the 13th floor of the library with several smaller collections assembled by Robert L. Hogue and John L. Skinner, and contributed on behalf of the American Poultry Historical Society.

Unfortunately, this treasure trove of American poultry history is under lock-and-key, available only by special permission, because in the 17 years it has sat on these shelves, it has never been cataloged.

The reason, according to Dr. Alan Fusonie, the NAL's historian and head of the library's Special Collections Program of which the poultry collection is a part, is that no funds have been available for this purpose.

The library may accept private collections, but if such books are to be cataloged, it is the responsibility of the contributing individuals or trade associations or the industry that will benefit from such collections to provide the funds necessary to catalog them.

A personal visit to the library found several of the book collections brought in by Hogue still in the cartons. The Gwin Collection must have originally been arranged on shelves in alpha order by author and title. Over the past 17 years, however, many of the books have, apparently, been used and not returned to their proper alpha order. As a result, finding certain titles today is a laborious task. Also, many of the older and most valuable books are in urgent need of repair. Bindings are rotting, pages are crumbling and covers are falling off.

According to Dr. Fusonie, it costs the library \$3 to \$5 to properly catalog a single volume. Multiply that by the 25,000 volumes currently in the poultry collections and you have an immediate need for some \$75,000 to \$125,000 to save this priceless remnant of our poultry heritage and make it usable for ourselves and our posterity.

This is the challenge to our industry today. The International Poultry Trade Show in Atlanta each year draws nearly 20,000 industry folks. If just half contributed \$10 a piece to the American Poultry Historical Society for the preservation and cataloging of the NAL's poultry collection, the work could be completed. — Dick Ammon.

Accounting Concerns Assume Burgeoning Role As Lobbyists, Often Outshoot Federal Bureaucrats

WASHINGTON—When Hewlett-Packard Co. faced the loss of millions of dollars from a proposed tax-law change, it turned for assistance to an unlikely lobbyist: an accounting firm.

The Palo Alto, Calif., electronics company last year asked Price Waterhouse to help stave off an Internal Revenue Service attempt to increase the taxes Hewlett-Packard pays on its earnings from abroad. Quietly and behind the scenes, the accounting firm brought big guns to bear; it deployed a former international tax counsel at Treasury and two former staff directors of the respected Congressional Joint Taxation Committee. As a result, the accountants held the bureaucrats at bay.

"Their Washington team is superb; it's hard to match it," says Larry Langdon, Hewlett-Packard's tax director. In any future efforts on Capitol Hill, Mr. Langdon adds, Price Waterhouse will continue as part of his team.

When most people think of lobbying, accountants don't usually come to mind. Influencing government officials is supposed to be rarer than that. In fact, though, the hottest tactic in lobbying these days pits corporate technicians-for-hire, like those at Price Waterhouse, against the government's own technicians. And increasingly, the government is simply outmatched.

An Increasing Role

"The impression of lobbying that most people have is standing in cocktail receptions and patting people on the back," says Rep. Rod Chandler (R., Wash.). In fact, he says, "it's much more a process of making the case." With the growing complexity of the tax code, expertise from an accounting firm will become an increasingly important part of any tax-oriented lobbying effort.

The practice has its critics. More traditional lobbying groups, such as lawyers, complain that the accountants are encroaching on their turf yet rarely register as lobbyists, which they say is exactly the role the accountants play. In response, the accountants claim that, legally, they can avoid going public with their activities because their contacts are "technical" and almost always with staff, not with lawmakers or policymakers—a fine distinction, they concede.

In addition, accountants who lobby face conflict-of-interest problems within their own firms. Anytime they concede that they advocate the view of any single client, they risk angering other clients of the firm who would benefit from a different stand. And the companies that hire the accountants for Washington work are often the same companies for which the accounting firms function as "independent" auditors.

But hire them they do, often with impressive results. Take the case of the mis-

placed decimal point. In 1987, congressional tax writers thought they could raise about \$300 million over three years by streamlining the tax rules regarding vacation pay. But thanks to client records, Price Waterhouse helped convince congressional estimators that the real revenue pickup was closer to \$3 billion. The ten-fold change, in effect, saved corporations billions of dollars in new taxes that lawmakers probably would have tried to get by raising some other business tax.

"We have an advantage" over government staffers, asserts Bernard (Bob) Shapiro, 47 years old, who heads the Price Waterhouse national tax practice here with Mark McConaghay, 48. "We may take two months to do an estimate that sometimes they have to do in one week. We have the time and resources to collect the data."

Messrs. Shapiro and McConaghay are former staff directors of the Joint Taxation Committee, Congress's repository of tax information and analysis. As Price Waterhouse partners in 1983, they began to build, for the benefit of corporations, a staff that mirrors the multidisciplined structure of the highly regarded staff they headed on Capitol Hill: lawyers, accountants, economists, revenue estimators and experts on every cranny of the federal tax code.

Today, the still-growing Price Waterhouse operation dwarfs the Joint Taxation Committee staff; it employs 123 professionals compared with 45 at Joint Tax. What began as a four-person operation in the corner of the seventh floor of a K Street office building in downtown Washington is about to take over the entire, 40,000-square-foot floor.

Shadow Government

Size is only part of the story. Price Waterhouse has become one of the first places top tax staffers turn when they decide to leave government—often when they are seeking more income. Its nickname among lobbyists is "Joint Tax West," and it is virtually a shadow federal government without the politicians; its employees include a former IRS commissioner, a former deputy comptroller of the currency and a former head of the IRS office of mergers and acquisitions. It also has begun a budget practice, analyzing the expenditure side of the federal government for private clients, with a former senior aide to both the House and Senate Budget committees.

Other big accounting firms also are beefing up. Touche Ross recently hired a former congressman, Hal Daub of Nebraska, to run its Washington office. The deputy staff director of the Joint Taxation Committee, Randall Weiss, is moving to Deloitte Haskins & Sells. And Peat Marwick & Main bought a revenue-estimating/consulting firm formed by a former top Treasury economist.

Because many of these accounting-firm employees have only recently left govern-

ment, they sometimes tend to present themselves as some kind of senior statesmen. "We feel close to the process," Mr. Shapiro of Price Waterhouse says. "We want to work in it, not against it."

But that line rarely sells. On Capitol Hill, Robert Leonard, staff director of the House Ways and Means Committee, says, "People who read their studies do so with some caution, realizing they are commissioned by companies and industries that have a financial stake in what the study proclaims."

Joint Taxation Committee staffers are particularly sensitive about the accountants' growing presence, and privately are both jealous and resentful. Top committee aides fret that the government's reputation for integrity might be compromised by the private accountants' assertions of close ties to them. When he was the committee's staff director, David Brockway once flew into a rage upon learning that a former Treasury official, now with Peat Marwick, was retained to help develop a data base for the Treasury that could be used to estimate how much revenue various excise-tax increases would produce. The contract was let anyway.

Still, the contacts between accounting firms and government staffs continue apace, and the corporations are clamoring for more of them. "Some of the very complex, sub-sub areas (of the tax code) are where the big bucks are," says Robert Perlman, vice president for taxation of Intel Corp. And Rep. Bill Frenzel (R., Minn.) of the House Ways and Means Committee, says of the growing number of accounting-firm services: "It provides more quality and more choice for the people who want to storm fortress Washington."

Several years ago Boyd, 40, was diagnosed with breast cancer. One year after surgery doctors



McConaughy Barocci Brown is the winner of the shootout for the \$11.5 million advertising account of the Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs, sources said. Appointment of a new agency, succeeding Zechman & Associates, is said to be imminent; the selection of McConaughy Barocci may be announced Friday or early next week. McConaughy Barocci, which already had its foot in the door with the state, having recently promoted Illinois tourism from Europe, competed against Burrell Advertising, DDB Needham Chicago and the incumbent. The account is largely focused on tourism. Preceding the new agency selection, DDB Needham Thursday sent a letter to state officials withdrawing from the competition. In its letter, which officials said they had not received, DDB Needham cited Gov. Thompson's decision not to run for re-election as the basis for its withdrawal. With a new administration in Springfield in 18 months, any new agency relationship could be short-lived. "Agency continuity is essential, especially during periods when there is possible disruption," DDB Needham said in its letter.

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

Words tempered through experience and wisdom

George McConaughey is right.

McConaughey, a former Glenrock mayor, perennial community activist, a mosquito marauder now entering the fifth decade of combat, and loyal civic volunteer, urged a return to the basic principle of community pride during a pointed but colorful presentation to the town council Monday.

Crusty George, placing a water-filled glass gallon jar containing hatching mosquito larvae on the wooden railing, said something must be done to return to the days when volunteers were quick to roll up their sleeves to work for the aesthetic qualities of the town, without regard for recognition or compensation.

"I'm not asking for any favors, outside of this," he told the council. "I may be old, I may have a broken back and a steel leg and a soft brain, but if I take it on I'll go through with it."

McConaughey is correct when he yearns for the good old days.

"I think that we've absolutely got all the wheels off the rail right now," he said. "We've got to get 'em back on and we've got to take care of first things first. And in my book, one of those is health. You don't get healthy by gettin' eaten by mosquitos and you don't get your head cleared by sniffin' those weeds."

In the golden years of Glenrock's history, money was not as plentiful as it is now and a benevolent uncle in Washington or a kind nephew in Glenrock was not available to provide all the services taken for granted today. The volunteers, either cutting the weeds around town or carrying buckets of oil or diesel to combat mosquitoes never expected recognition, praise and certainly not compensation.

The town council listened to McConaughey's words and sympathized with them. Mayor John Rookstool nodded in agreement.

"George has been the first in line when it came to volunteering," he said. "He's always been out chasing mosquitoes. He knows where all their favorite hiding places are. That's what we really need to capitalize on is sticking George in the cab of a pickup to make sure somebody else learns where those hiding places are, too."

Rookstool said Glenrock could use more individuals cast from McConaughey's mold.

"I wish more people in this community would follow in his footsteps," he said, "and not worry if there's no payment."

It would certainly please George to suddenly see the residents of the community cleaning up their yards, removing the weeds, and even occasionally donning hip waders and going to battle against the formidable mosquito enemy.

It would make George happy and it would certainly make Glenrock a better, healthier and happier place to live.

If not, George may make another presentation, possibly this time to the chamber of commerce, the economic development group or the Glenrock Education Association.

Barn stage manager tackle

Stage managing is a tough job. Anyone who has ever done it can vouch for that.

So, it would seem that Tamra McConoughey of Bettendorf must be either an extremely dedicated person or a gutton for punishment. She's currently stage managing "Alone Together," her third show in one season at Playcrafters Barn Theater in Moline.

Ms. McConoughey was never involved in theater until she auditioned at The Barn for "Crimes of the Heart" last season. "It was just a whim, an adventure," she said.

She didn't get a part in the play but was asked to work on the costume crew. She accepted the assignment and enjoyed herself immensely, she said. Next, she auditioned for "You Can't Take It With You" and got the role of the "dingbat ballerina," Essie.

That was the last time Ms. McConoughey auditioned for anything. She was asked by Connie Donis to be stage manager for "Charley's Aunt." "That shocked me," she said. "I didn't think I had the experience for it. But Connie had confidence in me."

Ms. McConoughey recalled that she really didn't have any idea what to expect. Marc Lewis, who was stage managing "To Gillian on Her 37th Birthday" at the time, took the novice under his wing and gave her some tips.

"He showed me how he set up his script, what to do, what to expect," Ms. McConoughey said. "It was something I had never experienced. Fortunately, it was a pretty easy show from a technical standpoint. It was a nice one to start with. And it prepared me for 'Play It Again, Sam.'"

"Play It Again, Sam" was her second stage managing job. "There was no comparison between the two shows," she said. "That show was unbelievable. There were cues on every page, actors I had to keep track of who were literally coming out of the walls. It was exciting."

"Alone Together" is somewhere between those two shows. "It's fairly easy as far as the technical aspects are concerned," she said, "but there are some tricky spots."

Ms. McConoughey said a stage manager has to keep

track of the blocking and prompt actors on their lines during rehearsal. "You have to be aware of any light and sound cues so that you can warn the crew," she said.

"And you have to keep track of the actors' entrances and exits. You have to make sure they're there when they're supposed to be. You keep track of the time and let everyone know when to take their places. You keep your eye on everything."

"Any emergency that comes up, the stage manager has to take care of. Once the show is in production, the director hands it over to the stage manager, and then he or she has to deal with any problems that might come up."

And the stage manager is expected to be there for every rehearsal and every performance.

"I feel I'm better at organizing than acting, so I enjoy being stage manager," Ms. McConoughey said. "I enjoy responsibilities of that sort. Stage managing is really not much different from what I do every day at work."

Ms. McConoughey works as a computer operator at First Federal in Davenport. That job, she said, requires the same type of organizational skills needed for stage managing.


Besides being stage manager, Ms. McConoughey also has worked on the props and costume committees. She's never worked lights and sound and is eager to try both of those jobs.

And she'd like to try her hand at acting again. She's planning to audition for the next Barn show, "Murder on the Nile."

"From what I know of the book and movie, there are a lot of characters in it," she said. "Maybe I'd have a chance of getting a small part. It would be fun to act again."

Ms. McConoughey has nothing but words of praise for the people at The Barn.

"I was inexperienced and they gave me my opportunity," she said. "They've really been nice to work with. There are a lot of people at The Barn I would call friends. And as long as they're willing to put up with me, I might as well stick around."

Robert L. Hogue, Mulberry, Ind., retiree and poultry industry consultant; former Indiana Extension poultry specialist;

member and worker for numerous state, national and international poultry organizations, including the American Poultry Historical Society and the National Agricultural Library.

Donald McQueen Shaver, Cambridge, Ontario, Canada, retired primary breeder of some of the world's top performing layer and broiler chickens; elected to the Canadian Agricultural Hall of Fame in 1987; to the International Poultry Hall of Fame in 1988; and a recognized leader in assisting less-developed countries of the world to build modern poultry industries to improve and increase their own food production.

John L. A 1966 Wheeling Central graduate, McConaughy turned down a minor-league baseball contract to enroll at West Liberty and is recognized as one of the most talented athletes ever to wear the Black-and-Gold.

A four-year letterman in both baseball and basketball, the heady guard captained the Hilltopper cagers each of his last two years and twice received All-WVIAC laurels for his roundball prowess while also garnering MVP Awards in both the Golden Valley Tournament (twice) and the Hall of Fame Tournament.

Equally adept with bat or glove, the hard-hitting shortstop earned honorable mention on the All-WVIAC baseball squad each of his first two seasons before moving up to the second team as a junior and copping first-team honors during his final campaign.

Now head coach of the baseball and women's basketball squads, Bo's diamond dandies have won the last four WVIAC championships — earning him conference coach-of-the-year recognition in 1985 and 1988 — while the lady cagers have shown steady improvement under his firm hand.

McConaughy will be introduced by men's basketball coach Tom Ackerman, himself a Hall of Fame member.



Dear Miss Susan,

In reply to your letter of January 29, I have not found any of the Sealock family in my papers, but I was more fortunate in a few hours of searching at the West Virginia State Archives, a resource only about ten minutes away, with a fair number of books on Virginia families.

I found printed references to both your Daniel and Thomas Sealock and their McConahay brides, Mary and Harriet, married in 1828 and 1823, respectively, in a book, Early Fauquier County, Virginia, Marriage Bonds, by Nancy Chappellear and John K. Gott, published by them at Washington, D.C., in 1965, pages 107 and 106.

The same reference also lists marriage bonds for the James McConahay and Ruthy Shaw (19 Mar 1805) that you mentioned, as well as an earlier bond (8 Aug 1796) for a James McConaha and Elizabeth Burroughs. (Mrs. Gregory says the two Jameses are the same person.)

In Table I, I've listed a total of 12 Sealock marriages, 11 in Fauquier County and one in Loudoun County. In Table II, there are eight McConahay marriages, all but one from the above reference. Again, the exception is a Loudoun County marriage, in this case the key marriage of Samuel McConahey and Anne Batson on 5 Apr 1804, the beginning of the Centerville, Indiana, line. The two Loudoun County events are given in a compilation by Mary Alice Wertz in Marriages of Loudoun County, Virginia: 1757-1853, published in Baltimore by Genealogical Publishing Company, in 1985.

I was alerted to look at Fauquier County records by way of indexes of censuses of Virginia from 1810 through 1850 (References No. 2, 3 and 8). Of course, Loudoun County was a logical choice, as the residence at one time of our patriarch James McConaughy/McConehu/McConochu/McConochee (ca.1741-1779). I've enclosed copies of my census worksheets which show the story on the Sealocks' places of residence - you may want to consider the other Virginia counties listed - Frederick, Warren and Washington - if you are pursuing Sealocks at any location.

I checked for variants in spelling of the Sealock name in the Census Bureau's A Century of Population Growth (Ref. 10) and found the following: Sillock, Selleck, Selick, Selig, Sellick, Silik and Sillick, which were reported to be those to be found in the original Census of 1790 for the whole country, but only in the states of Connecticut (29 families), New York (8), Pennsylvania (3) and Vermont (3) - none in Virginia or the other states.

This was somewhat surprising, I thought, as other references such as Filby (Ref. 4) and Swem (Ref. 9) show the presence of Sealocks in Virginia as early as 1654, although the documents cited in support (Refs. 6, 7, 11 and 12) do give an impression that residence may have been temporary in some cases.

Spelling variants in the references just cited are minimal - three "Sellick's" and one "Sellacke". Although we've become a little hardened to spelling changes of those days, it was a relief to come across (in Ref. 5) a genuine "Sealock" - given name no less than "Thomas" - a poll-tax payer in Loudoun County, in 1782. This might just be the "Thomas Sealock, Sen." listed in the Census of 1810 for Fauquier County as a man 45 or older, with a wife, probably, of a similar age and two children - a boy under 10, and a girl over 10 but not yet 16 (Ref. 8: Vol. I).

Besides, "Sealock" is much the nicer rendering, fans of Actor Tom Selleck (my good wife is one) notwithstanding. (Where did his people come from, I wonder?)

Looking at the five census worksheets side-by-side, I was interested to see that there is a "William" on every one, two "Thomases" (possibly father and son) on the earliest and none on any later one, and no "Daniel" at all!

A check of the other books available on Fauquier and Loudoun County families did not turn up anything further on the Sealocks. I've listed these references separately, hoping this may spare you some effort. Included at the end of this list is a reference that sounds good, but which contains not a single Sealock or McConahay.

* * *

Practically all of my McConahay time (my mother was named Pauline Wagner McConihay) has been devoted to this location - the Kanawha Valley of West Virginia, where Great-great-grandfather John McConihay (1793-1880) relocated from Bedford County, Va., in 1828, bringing his wife, Mary Pell Hurt (1805-1863), and the first four of their fifteen children. I've nearly completed collecting local information on this branch, and hope to put together some kind of a story for my son and his children, and cousins about as numberless as the leaves on a tree - all good people, of course -

My files are still very modest respecting the McConahays of Bucks County, Pa., and Old Virginia, in fact, about all I know about them has been the result of Mrs. Gregory's bountiful sharing, and the article she prepared for the eleventh issue of the Annual Bulletin of The McConaughey Society of America, pages 66-67, entitled, "The 'I' Line of Virginia."

So, I would be delighted to learn anything at all about the original James, the first generation of his descendants, and his brother Thomas. Have you ever worked out a birthdate for your James, the son of the original James? (Your James's brother John was the father of the John McConihay I mentioned above.)

I've enjoyed meeting your Sealocks - acquired a few bits of information on my other lines at the same time - and wish you the best of luck with your other researches.

DEAN-The Dean family, worthily represented for many years by the late Samuel Dean, who was one of the best known and most highly honored citizens of Fairmont, and whose demise brought sorrow to all with whom he was brought in constant contact, is of English origin, members thereof having borne well their part in all the affairs of life.

William White, who came to America in the "Mayflower," and was the father of the first English child born in New England, was an indirect ancestor of Samuel Dean, of this sketch.

(I) Samuel Dean, immigrant ancestor, was born in England, from whence he emigrated to this country, about 1754, settling in Cumberland county, Pennsylvania, where he followed the occupation of farming, deriving therefrom a comfortable livelihood. He married and among his children was Samuel, of whom further.

(II) Samuel (2), son of Samuel (1) Dean, was born in Cumberland county, Pennsylvania, where he was living in 1790, active in the affairs of the community wherein he resided. He served in the revolutionary war, enlisting three times, twice when his father was drafted and once when his brother Thomas was drafted, his enlistments occurring in April, 1779, March, 1780, and April, 1781. This fact demonstrates his patriotism, and this excellent trait of character was inherited by his children and members of the later generations. Five of the sons of Samuel (1) Dean served in the revolutionary war. He married and became the father of one son, Elisha, of whom further, and two daughters. Several members of the family served in the war of 1812.

(II) Elisha, son of Samuel (2) Dean, was born in Maryland, where he was reared and educated. He was a farmer and trader, in which lines of work he was highly successful. Subsequently he removed to Addison, Somerset county, Pennsylvania. His death occurred in the west, and he left as a priceless heritage an honored name.

He married Rachel Wright, a young lady of rare beauty and noble character, and there was born to them ten children. When the father was taken from them the care, education and training of the younger members of the family fell largely upon Samuel, and his older brother, Hezekiah. Elisha, one of

the younger brothers, died in early manhood-being drowned while bathing in the Youghiogheny river below Somerfiled, Pennsylvania. Sarah died fourteen years ago, not having married. The other sisters and brothers are living at the time of the writing. Hezekiah, resides with his daughter Maud Leslie at the old homestead in Addison, Pennsylvania; Martha, wife of Dr. William F. Mitchell, at Addison; Nancy (Dean) Brooks at York, Nebraska; Nathaniel at York, Nebraska; James W., at Bellefontaine, Iowa; N. M., at Portland, Oregon; L. H., at Braddock, Pennsylvania.

(IV) Samuel (3), son of Elisha and Rachel (Wright) Dean, was born in Maryland, March 29, 1846. died January 5, 1910, at his home in Fairmont, West Virginia. He was reared on his father's farm, and attended the subscription schools of Maryland until he was twelve years of age, when he removed with his parents to Addison, Pennsylvania. When the civil war broke out he was teaching school; this was on account of his youth, he being only sixteen years of age when he enlisted. For a time after enlisting he clerked in Major (or General) Andrew's office. Mr. Andrews became much attached to him and asked him-after learning he had but the single name-to take his name as a middle name, which he did, always after writing it with the initial A, if not the Andrew complete, and in later life when he united with the church was baptized as Samuel Andrew. He became a member of the Third Maryland Potomac Home Brigade; during the war he was a prisoner at Frederick, Maryland, and at the time of his death a member of Allegheny County Association Union ex-Prisoners of War. He was promoted twice as a reward for gallant and meritorious service, and when mustered out was serving in the rank of sergeant; he was promoted lieutenant, but the war closed and he was mustered out before the commission arrived.

Upon the return of the brothers from the war, they opened a general store in Addison, which they conducted successfully until 1898, when Samuel A. Dean removed to Fairmont, West Virginia, where he engaged in various business enterprises. He retired from active work about a year previous to his death. By his strict business methods, ability of a high order, and steadfast determination to live up to the "Golden Rule." he achieved a large degree of success in his undertakings. During his residence in Addison, Pennsylvania, he established the first telegraph station there, and served as telegrapher for more than twenty years, discharging his duties in a highly commendable manner. He also served in the capacity of postmaster of Addison, tenure of office being noted for promptness and efficiency. He organized the Milton Black Post, Grand Army of the Republic, at Addison, of which he was a member for many years. Meade Post, No. 6, attended his funeral services in a body and conducted the usual ritual at his grave in Woodlawn cemetery. He held membership in the First Presbyterian Church of Fairmont, in which he served as trustee for several years, taking an active

interest in all branches of its work. He was a consistent Christian, and won and retained the confidence and esteem of his fellow citizens.

Mr. Dean married Isabelle Florence, daughter of David and Ann (Davis) McConaughey, September 17, 1890. Children: David McConaughey, born August 10, 1891, student at West Virginia University; June, born June 28, 1894; Florence, born February 14, 1896. Mr and Mrs. Dean reared two girls, caring for them until their marriages, thus exemplifying a true Christian spirit. For several years prior to his death Mr. Dean and his family spent the summer months at their farm, "View Point," located a few miles from the city of Fairmont. David McConaughey and his wife were born in Tyrone, Ireland. He came to this country and settled at Wheeling, West Virginia, where he accepted a clerkship in the Dollar Savings Bank, and he also held various positions of trust. He owned five general stores in West Virginia; late in life he settled on a tract of land which he owned, and where the town of Cameron, Marshall county, West Virginia, is now located. He and his wife brought up a large family, and name is honored throughout the state.
